### **Region 6 Flight Teams**

The Region 6 Crisis Flight Team is a support service available to all of the Region 6 (IU08, IU10 and IU11) member school districts. The team is made up of trained individuals who are willing to render aid in response to a school crisis. The Flight Team does not take over responsibility for the response, but rather, lends support, guidance, and suggestions based on their training and expertise. At the conclusion of each day the on-site team conducts a debrief session with the home school leaders to determine whether additional assistance will be required. The main goal of the Flight Team is to help the school regain stability in the wake of a crisis by supporting students and staff members experiencing loss, grief or trauma. The Flight Team also supports the school administrator's efforts to manage the many details associated with the response to a crisis. The number of flight team members who respond to a building depends on the event and needed follow-up.

### When might a flight team be activated?

- Accidental death or serious injury
- Suicide
- Murder
- Missing child
- Terminally ill student in the class
- •Trauma (natural disaster, accidents, crime)
- •High coverage media event
- Other traumatic event

### What does the Crisis Response Team assistance include?

- Monitoring and counseling for students/staff in need
- •Filling in for building staff so they can deal with the crisis
- Facilitating community referrals and networking
- Support rooms for students and/or staff in crisis
- Crisis management communication and procedural support for building administration
- Coping strategy information for building staff
- Assisting with follow-up needs

The Office for Safe Schools, Pennsylvania Department of Education, announced a PA Bullying Prevention Consultation Line. The Bullying Prevention Consultation Line is a toll free number that allows individuals experiencing chronic and unresolved bullying to discuss effective strategies and available resources to deal with school-based bullying. This resource has been developed in collaboration with the Center for Health Promotion and Disease Prevention. ### CYBER SECURITY

## PARENT AND EDUCATOR TIPCARD (from Stop/Think/Connect)

Children are being exposed to technology increasingly each day and at even younger ages than before. Often these children also have a better understanding of how technology works than adults and parents. In order for children to be safe online and to make safe and smart choices with their technology, it requires the adults in their lives to remind them about practicing healthy cybersecurity hygiene and help them as they learn the advantages and disadvantages of technology and the Internet.

### DID YOU KNOW?

Parents of teens are notably less likely than parents of younger children age six to nine to say they monitor technology usage very closely.

Seven in ten young people are victims of cyberbullying and 37 percent experience cyberbullying on a frequent basis.

### SIMPLE TIPS FOR PROTECTING KIDS

- Create an open and honest environment with kids.
- Start conversations regularly about practicing online safety.
- Emphasize the concept of credibility to teens: not everything they see on the Internet is true and people on the Internet may not be who they appear to be.
- Watch for changes in behavior if your child suddenly avoids the computer, it may be a sign they are being bullied online.
- Review security settings and privacy policies for the websites kids frequent. These settings are frequently updated so check back regularly.
- Make sure mobile devices are secure. Use PINs and passwords, only install apps from trusted sources, and understand the privacy settings and permissions for all apps.
